

Path to home: caring for your ostomy after bowel surgery

Decide with you the best area for your stoma to be placed. 		<p>The ET nurse or your nurse will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Change the ostomy appliance with you. Show you how to measure the stoma and apply a new ostomy appliance. Explain how to take care of the skin around your stoma. 		<p>The ET nurse will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Give you a kit to go home with that has your own supplies and a list of what to order. Review stoma care, preventing leakage and taking care of the skin around the stoma.

Glossary

Enterostomal Therapy (ET) nurse: A nurse who specializes in ostomy care.

Ostomy: An opening made into your intestine or bowel.

(Ileostomy = an opening made into your small bowel. Colostomy = an opening made into your large bowel).

Ostomy appliance: A device for collecting stool that has 2 parts to it: a skin barrier and a pouch.

Pouch: The bag that collects the stool from the stoma.

Skin barrier: The part of the ostomy appliance that is attached to the skin. The skin barrier protects the skin from the stool and mucus, and holds the pouch to your skin.

Stoma: The part of the bowel that is seen outside the body after ostomy surgery.

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
